An ANU expert spoke up for researchers. Federal politicians listened.

As president of the Australian Institute of Physics, Professor Jodie Bradby wrote a Conversation article on reports that political interference was holding up the announcement of 200 early career researcher grants. (In the interests of fairness, this article was held for two days to give the federal minister's office a chance to respond.)

Less than three hours after her article appeared in The Conversation, the full list of DECRA grant winners was posted on the ARC website.

This also prompted a Greens push to standardise future ARC announcements, while two other MPs – Labor's Andrew Leigh and Centre Alliance's Rebekha Sharkie – both mentioned Professor Bradby's article in Parliament when speaking in support of the amendment.



Who reads The Conversation?

The Conversation is different to other media, because we only publish stories by academics and researchers. But our audience is much more diverse than that.

Our readers include time-poor policymakers looking for useful research (13%), teachers looking for credible but clearly written teaching resources (13%), students, people in the health sector, business, and beyond.



Author impact and engagement



We have 15,000 published academics in Australia, and more than 80,000 academics registered globally.

After publishing with us, 66% of Australian authors report being contacted by media for follow up, including interviews on TV, radio, online, print or elsewhere.

Other ways that our authors have impact include being contacted by government (9%), invited to speak at conferences (22%), contacted for research collaboration (22%), or approached for business consultation (14%).



The Conversation's Australia & New Zealand edition now has 5.8 million unique readers on site, and 16.5 million article views on site and via republication (January 2020).

Launched from Australia in 2011, we now have editions – in multiple languages – in the UK, US, sub-Saharan Africa, France, Canada, Spain & Indonesia. The map above shows our editors around the world.
